## Head Start and Early Head Start

The UCAP Head Start program consolidated three federal grants into one grant. Grant 05 CH 00148 now serves children and families prenatal to age 5 in nine rural Minnesota Counties: Cottonwood, Jackson, Kandiyohi, Lincoln, Lyon, McLeod, Meeker, Redwood, and Renville Counties. Additionally, the program also receives state funded Early Head Start used to operate a Home-Based option, as well as additional supplemental funding through other sources.

During the 2020-2021 school year, 549 families received services through the Head Start and Early Head Start program (EHS).

Head Start provided services to 443 preschool aged children in grant 05CH011468, ages 3-5, in a classroom setting. Head Start maintained an average monthly enrollment of $88 \%$.

Early Head Start (prenatal to 3-years) maintained an average monthly enrollment of 99\% and provided services to 172 children. State funds provided access of an additional 68 EHS slots.

## 92\% of children in Grant 05CH01468 served were income or categorically eligible for Head Start

## Of those children enrolled in Grant 05CH011468:

- $62 \%$ of children enrolled were under $100 \%$ of poverty.
- $9 \%$ of children enrolled were receiving public assistance, such as Minnesota Family Investment Program (MFIP) or Supplemental Security Income (SSI).
- $5 \%$ were either homeless or a foster child.
- $16 \%$ were between $100 \%$ and $130 \%$ of federal poverty line.

UCAP Head Start received a Focus Area 1 Remote Monitoring visit from June 7 to June 10, 2021. The program was in compliance with the requirements of the Head Start Program Performance Standards (HSPPS) and the Head Start Act of 2007. There were many performance strengths identified.

## Health outcomes Grant 05CH011468:

- 80.4\% Head Start and 37.2\% EHS enrolled children received medical exams and were up to date on age-appropriate preventive and primary health care.
- $95 \%$ Head Start and $84.3 \%$ EHS children at the end of the enrollment year were up to date on all immunizations appropriate for their age.
- $48.5 \%$ of children received a professional dental exam during the program year. Of those children who received a dental exam, $34.4 \%$ required treatment.
- $31.1 \%$ of children who needed dental treatment received it.

Head Start had 559 volunteers throughout the 2020-2021 school year. Of those volunteers, 500 (89\%) were current or former Head Start parents.

## School Readiness:

Head Start students made substantial gains across all learning domains during the 2020-2021 school year. School readiness goals were achieved by $77.8 \%$ of 4 -year-olds. Goals in socialemotional development, physical development, language, and literacy were generally met. When children had attendance levels above $80 \%$, children were more likely to have met school readiness goals. Additionally, children performed better when they received more than oneyear of services and when classrooms had higher CLASS scores, specifically in instructional supports.
