United Community Action Partnership (UCAP) Head Start takes a comprehensive, two-generation approach to supporting school readiness and family well-being. The program focuses on the child as well as the parents and entire family. By partnering with families, Head Start provides services that help children develop academically, physically, and socially so they are fully prepared to enter kindergarten.

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The UCAP Head Start program serves children and families prenatal to age 5 in nine rural Minnesota Counties: Cottonwood, Jackson, Kandiyohi, Lincoln, Lyon, McLeod, Meeker, Redwood, and Renville Counties. Additionally, the program also receives state funds and additional supplemental funding through community sources.

During the 2024–2025 school year, a cumulative of 578 children received services through the federally funded Head Start (Preschool and Early Head Start) program (EHS).

Head Start preschool provided services to 407 preschool aged children, ages 3–5, in a classroom setting. Head Start maintained an average monthly enrollment of 97–100%.

State funds provided access to an additional 16 slots.

Early Head Start (prenatal to 3-years) maintained an average monthly enrollment of 100% and provided services to 171 children and pregnant moms. State funds provided access to an additional 60 EHS slots.

UCAP served an estimated 26% of Head Start eligible children in its service area.

- 20% OF CHILDREN ENROLLED WERE UNDER 100% OF POVERTY GUIDELINES.
- 60% OF CHILDREN ENROLLED WERE RECEIVING PUBLIC ASSISTANCE, SUCH AS MINNESOTA FAMILY INVESTMENT PROGRAM (MFIP),
- SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY INCOME (SSI), OR SNAP.
- 6% WERE EITHER HOMELESS OR A FOSTER CHILD.
- 5% WERE BETWEEN 100% AND 130% OF THE FEDERAL POVERTY LINE.

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HEALTH OUTCOMES GRANT 05CH012507

- 76% OF ENROLLED CHILDREN RECEIVED MEDICAL EXAMS AND WERE UP TO DATE ON AGE-APPROPRIATE PREVENTIVE AND PRIMARY HEALTH CARE.
- 92% HEAD START PRESCHOOL AND 78% EHS CHILDREN AT THE END OF THE ENROLLMENT YEAR WERE UP TO DATE ON ALL IMMUNIZATIONS APPROPRIATE FOR THEIR AGE.
- 63% OF CHILDREN RECEIVED A PROFESSIONAL DENTAL EXAM DURING THE PROGRAM YEAR. OF THOSE CHILDREN WHO RECEIVED A DENTAL EXAM, 25% REQUIRED TREATMENT.
- 50% OF CHILDREN WHO NEEDED DENTAL TREATMENT RECEIVED IT.

VOLUNTEERS

Head Start had 560 volunteers throughout the 2024 – 2025 school year. Of those volunteers, 453 (81%) were current or former Head Start parents.

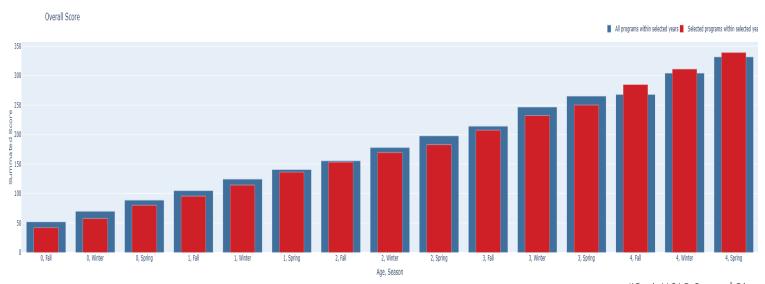


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SCHOOL READINESS

Head Start students made substantial gains across all learning domains during the 2024–2025 school year. School readiness goals were achieved by 77.8% of 4-year-olds. Goals in social-emotional development, physical development, language, literacy, and math were generally met. When children had attendance levels above 90%, children were more likely to have met school readiness goals. Additionally, children performed better when they received more than one-year of services and when classrooms had higher CLASS scores, specifically in instructional supports.
